24-25 Elementary School Student Intervention Guidelines

This matrix serves as a guideline of considerations for administrators when considering disciplinary consequences based on student misconduct. Discipline punitive consequences should be combined with restorative actions. These restorative actions may include but are not limited to, counseling, connecting the student and parent with resources, parent meetings, and activities to improve school culture and build a more positive school climate.

Teachers are directed to address issues occurring within the classroom and/or their supervision by utilizing the following Positive Behavioral Intervention and Supports ("PBIS") continuum. Minor offenses will be handled within the classroom.

LEVELS OF DISCIPLINARY INTERVENTIONS

The level of disciplinary consequence is determined by the specific infraction.

- Level 1 Warning and re-teaching of expectations/restitution
- Level 2 Staff assigned consequence/behavior reflection/restitution
- Level 3 Conference/loss of privilege/parent notification/behavior reflection/other means of correction/restitution
- Level 4 Possible counselor referral/conference with administrator, and all Level 3 interventions
- Level 5 Counselor referral/possible Student Success Team ("SST") process initiation/conflict mediation/other means of correction and all Level 4 interventions
- Level 6 Suspension (1-5 days) and parent conference/in-house suspension and all Level 5 interventions
- Level 7 Suspension (1-5 days)/possible involuntary school transfer (parent may appeal).
- Level 8 Recommend expulsion/involuntary school transfer (parent appeal per Board Policy 5152)

OTHER MEANS OF CORRECTION

Other means of correction may include, but are not limited to:

- Conference with student's parents, SST meetings, and other behavioral intervention groups
- Referrals to a psychologist or other school support service personnel
- Development and implementation of a behavior plan
- Enrollment in a restorative practices, emotional regulation, or prosocial behavior program
- Referral for a comprehensive assessment, including for purposes of creating an Individual Education Plan ("IEP") or Section 504 plan
- Positive behavior support with tiered interventions occurring during the school day

DOCUMENTING DISCIPLINE PROCESS AND CONSEQUENCE

Action Taken	Definition
Action Pending	Consequence for referral is pending. Referral will be modified when "action taken" is determined.
Additional Attendance/ Saturday School	Consequence for referral results in student attending classes on a Saturday.
Alternative Placement	Consequence for referral results in student being placed in a different educational setting
Bus Suspension	Consequence for referral results in 1-3 day period when students are not allowed on the bus.
Community Service	Consequence for referral results in involvement in community service activities or projects.
Conference with Student	Consequence for referral results in student meeting with administrator, teacher, and/or parent (in any combination).
Expulsion	Consequence for referral results in student being dismissed from school for one or more days.
In-School Suspension	Consequence for referral results in a period of time spent away from scheduled activities/classes during the school day.

Parent Contact	Consequence for referral results in parent communication by phone, email, or person-to-person about the problem.
Restitution/Community Service	Consequence for referral results in apologizing or compensating for loss, damage, or injury; community services.
Time in Office	Consequence for referral results in student spending time in the office away from scheduled activities/classes.
Time Out/Detention	Consequence for referral results in student spending time in a specified area away from scheduled activities/classes.

LEGAL REFERENCES

EDUCATION CODE SECTION 48900

Suspension shall be imposed only when other means of correction fall to bring about proper conduct. However, suspension on the first offense is authorized for 48900 (a) through (e) offenses and/or when the pupil's presence causes a danger to persons. (EC §48900.5) Discretion maybe used to provide alternatives to suspension or expulsion that are age appropriate and designed to address the specific misbehavior (EC §48900 (v)).

- a.1. Caused, attempted to cause, or threatened to cause physical injury.
- a.2. Willfully used force or violence on another person, except in self-defense.
- b. Possessed, sold or otherwise furnished any firearm, knife, explosive, or other dangerous object.
- c. Possessed, used, sold, furnished, or been under the influence of any controlled substance, alcohol, or intoxicant
- d. Offered, arranged, or negotiated to sell a controlled substance, alcohol or intoxicant and then provided a replica substance.
- e. Attempted or committed robbery or extortion.

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- f. Attempted or caused damage to school or private property.
- g. Attempted or stole school or private property.
- h. Possessed, or used a tobacco product.
- i. Committed an obscene act or engaged in habitual profanity or vulgarity.
- j. Possessed, offered, arranged, or negotiated to sell drug paraphernalia.
- k. Disrupted school activities or defied school personnel. (Grades 4-12, suspension only)
- 1. Knowingly received stolen school or private property.
- m. Possessed an imitation firearm.
- n. Attempted or committed sexual assault or committed a sexual battery.
- o. Harassed, threatened, or intimidated a student complainant or witness in a school disciplinary matter.
- p. Unlawfully offered, arranged to sell, negotiated to sell, or sold the prescription drug Soma.
- q. Engaged in, or attempted to engage in, hazing.
- r. Engaged in an act of bullying, including cyberbullying and cyber sexual bullying.
- t. Aided or abetted in the attempted or infliction of physical injury to another. Expel only when connected to (a)
- .2 Committed sexual harassment. (Grades 4-12)
- .3 Attempted, threatened, caused, or participated in hate violence. (Grades 4-12)
- .4 Harassment, threats or intimidation creating an intimidating or hostile educational environment. (Grades 4-12)
- .7 Made terroristic threats against school officials or property.

- u. School property includes electronic files and databases.
- w. Alternatives to suspension/expulsion should be applied to students who are truant, tardy or absent from school.

EDUCATION CODE SECTION 48915 - Expulsion

s. Act must be related to a school activity or school attendance occurring within a school under the jurisdiction of a district, including but not limited to: 1) while on school grounds; 2) while going to or coming from school; 3) during the lunch period on or off campus; or 4) during or while going to or from a school sponsored activity.

•• Report all offenses in §48900 for jurisdiction consideration••

Principal or Superintendent shall recommend expulsion for offenses which occur at school or at a school activity off school grounds, unless it should not be under the circumstances or an alternative means of correction would address the conduct:

- a.l. (A) Causing serious injury to another person, except in self-defense.
- a.l. (B) Possession of a knife, or other dangerous object of no reasonable use to the pupil.
- a.1.(C) Unlawful possession of any controlled substance except for the first offense for the possession of not more than one avoirdupois (by weight) ounce of marijuana, other than concentrated cannabis.
- a.l.(D) Robbery or extortion.
- a.I.(E) Assault or battery on any school employee.

For expulsion under §48915 (a) or §48900 (a) through (r) or §48900.2, .3, or .7, there must be a finding of either of the following(§48915(b) or (e)):

- (1) That other means of correction are not feasible or have repeatedly failed to bring about the proper conduct.
- That due to the nature of the violation, the presence of the pupil causes a continuing danger to the physical safety of the pupil or others.

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The following offenses require suspension and recommendation for expulsion:

- c.1. Sale, possession or furnishing a firearm. (Exception for imitation firearm)
- c.2. Brandishing a knife at another person. (See also EC§ 48915(g))
- c.3. Selling a controlled substance.
- c.4. Attempted or committed sexual assault or committed sexual battery.
- c.5. Possession of an explosive.
